- 4. That religious leader's be fair in teaching the tenets of their faith to give equal support to both sexes without favouritism.
- That government should show genuine interest and commitment in implementing policies that will empower her citizens and develop the nation so as to compete with others favouribly.
- That government leader's shaddle with the responsibility of releasing funding and provision of structural facilities do so without delay or doing shabby work that may not last.

- That women need to stand up for themselves and request for assistance to enable them
 take part in acquiring education without engaging in anti social behavior that are
 detrimental to learning and womanhood.
- 8. That wealthy person's should encourage women education by being supportive in provision of either facilities where women with babies can keep them, school materials like textbooks, scholars, free education for women or uniforms.
